\*\*\* GUEST EDITORIAL \*\*\*

The day of the Extra and First Class license is almost upon us. Certainly incentive licensing will do its part in improving our bands and the quality of the signals contained therein. However, let us not lose sight of the fact that the purpose behind the incentive licensing proposals is to improve the radio amateur, and his "image," before the world in general and other users of the radio spectrum in particular. This is of primary importance if we are to retain our bands.

But will merely passing a 20 WPM code test and a "tough" written exam save our bands? I think not-- to think that it would lead to disaster. It will help, but operation in the public interest is the key. And how do we, as DXers, serve the public interest? Not very well, I'm afraid. Here we have the tremendous potential, with our huge beams and our kilowatts, to spread the word to the world that we really are "good guys," not "bad guys." And what do we do? We exchange RSTs rather than ideas.

I worked a 16 year old VE7 on 15 meters several weeks ago and had a nice long chat with him, with a few words of advice on how he could improve the note on his DX-60. His card came the other day with this note: "Our QSO certainly raised my opinion of W6's." The price of this good will was only half an hour of my time.

I'm not advocating a long rag chew with every DX station worked, but when the band is "dead," work a JA, VK, Z1, UAØ and find out what he does for a living, and let him know what you do (besides work DX, hi). I've worked a JA who's very interested in sports car racing, a UAØ who was surprised to learn that not every W6 runs a KW and that not every house in California has a swimming pool, and a VK school teacher who was surprised to learn that few of our high schools teach calculus.

It only takes an hour or two a week. Your country total may not go up as rapidly, but at least it will help to assure that those "countries" will be there a while longer.

In the past, few NCDXC Members have participated in this contest, and only a small percentage of these have sent in their scores. As a consequence, the NCDXC annually relegates itself to a position near the bottom of the Club Standings, while the Southern Calif. boys put in a good (for them, that is) showing.

This year, things will be different! The membership has voted to enter the CQ Contest en masse, with club trophies going to the Multi-band CW and Phone winners. For members with only a single-band antenna, CQ Magazine awards certificates in the Single-Band category.

Here is your opportunity to try out that new gear or antenna on a competitive basis, in a contest that is undoubtedly one of the most enjoyable. Remember, there are no quotas to worry about on Phone or CW, and it is only a one-week-end per mode affair. Furthermore, this contest is tops in DX participation with well over 100 countries on both CW and Phone sending in their scores last year.

All NCDXC members are highly encouraged to participate in the CQ WW DX contest this year, and really make our first venture a good one. Whether you put in 48 hours or only 4 hours, be sure to submit your logs before the deadline. Don't forget to indicate on your logs that you are participating for the Northern California DX Club.

NCDXC Members attending the October Club Meeting may obtain contest log sheets, summary sheets, rules, and zone maps there. Members not able to attend may send a stamped (10¢ postage please) self-addressed envelope (business style) to

1. Reduce the technical requirements for the novice exam.
2. Allow Technicians some high-frequency CW bands.
3. Take nothing from the General, and increase input power to perhaps 2 KW.
4. First Class to be allowed 2 to 5 KW.
5. Extra Class to be allowed 2 to 10 KW.
6. Avoid all possible sub-bands within the amateur bands.

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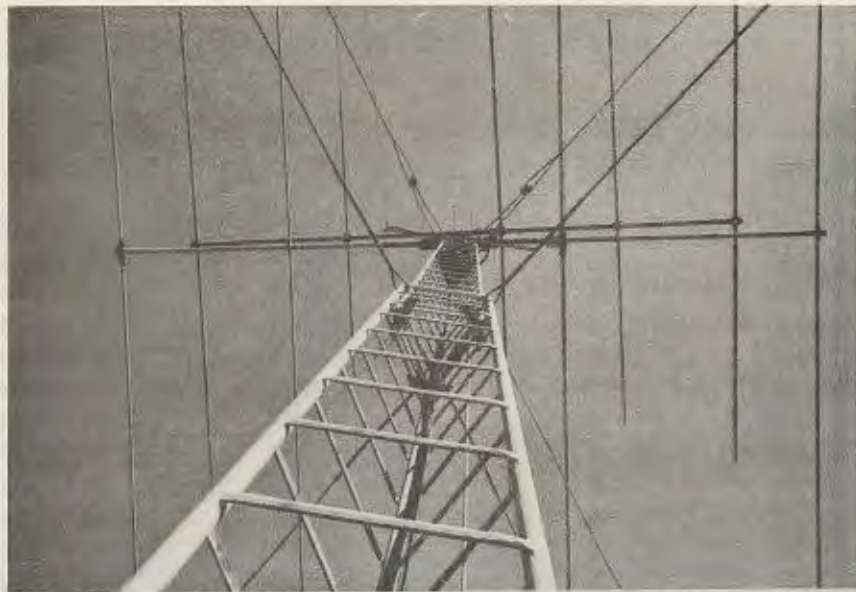
