It is fortunate for NCDXC that our worthy Editor of this worthy mag decided that he liked amateur radio more than he liked stamp collecting, or coin collecting, or drag racing, or radio cortrol model airplanes or tropical fish or model railroading, or skin diving, or etcetera, etcetera. Because if he didn't like amateur radio the best, he would be in one of those other pursuits editing their paper, because ole Cliff is a competitor who enjoys getting into his obbies "in depth" as the big telly programs say now. To wit, Cliff copped a trophy at Fresno....just like he copped about 100 trophies drag racing!

Cliff is a Mountain Man---hailing from Grass Valley, California. Cliff got through the 7th grade in Grass Valley, then his family began moving, and Cliff whet to the 8th grade in Vallejo, 9th in Richmond, 10th and 11th in Hermiston, Oregon and back to Grass Valley for the 12th.

All this early travelling must have gotten into his blood, because in 1949, Cliff joined the Air Force and went into Radio Operator's School in Boloxi, Mississippi. Naturally, having become aclimated to the banana belt, they sent him to Adak Island in the Aleutians for 14 months where he worked the CW radio circuits. Then back to Merced where he got a few months of voice operation air-ground at Castle AFB. Then on to Travis AFB working air-ground circuits until his discharge in October 1952.

After service, Cliff wht to work for Standard Oil in Richmond in the Electronics Slop. After 18 months apprenticahip, he was designated Edectronics Tech and has been with Standard in that capacity ever since.

But it was during those long nights on Adak that Cliff got interested in ham radio. He had picked up all the necessary requirements, but didn't get to know much about the amateur side until he helped assemble a MARS station. But it wasn't until Cliff got back to Richmond in 1954, that he met KN6GNB and was invited to the Richmond Amateur Radio Club. This time it took and Cliff got his ticket as KN6HIH Aug. 25, 1954. In the same club at the time he met other NCDXC members W6EJA, K6AUC, W6TWI, K6HEM and K6ILG.

Cliff began his ham life with a 6AG7 Ocs pumping 3 watts into a 125 ft. long wire. He managed to work all up and down the West Coast before he went QRO with an 807 and 70 watts. Then the DX tegan to roll in with overseas QSO's.

At that time, The Richmond Clib had a lot of mobileers. So Cliff built up a robile rig--6AG7-2E26 modulated with a pair of 6V6's. He used an ARC 5 receiver and a home-made whip and he was mobile on 80. Transmitter Hunts were the big thing, and come Friday nights, the Richmond Fellas would play Hunt and Find until the wee hours. Then adjourn for breakfast

In 1957, Cliff moved into a pair of 813s and a Super Pro and a 20 meter vertical and got into DXing. But whaddayouknow.... all of a sudden Cliff needed another challenge. So he dropped ham radio in favor of radio controlled airplane flying. But that gave way to skin diving for a few years. Then he switched into drag racing and went for the Big Time.

Cliff attachek Drag Racing with the same compositive vigor he now attacks a DX contest. He began racing with a 1953 Olds, then switched to a '53 Hudson and finally to a 1954 Hudson. With that car he won about 100 trophies including two Northern California Championships.

In 1967 Cliff went to India for a year. No drag racing there, but there was a little radio and Cliff began to recall some of the dryr of glory on the low end of 20.

When he got Stateside again, Cliff made a fatal decision, he took up with K6AUC---Cliff always lived dangerously as you can see from his record of activities. Well, to associate with Big Jawn, you HAVE to speak DX, or you ain't talkin'. So Cliff began where he left off with this 813s, and has to date worked 237 with 208 confirmed.

Naturally, when Cliff put up that first beam, the neighbors knew that he was responsible for all the troubles to their TVs which they had had for the past 5 years. He even had the neighbors beating on his door when he was at work demanding he get off the air. Cliff admits it is a bit easier now though. The rigs are better--both ham rigs and TVs, and then there are always the nearby CBers to blame... and Cliff is surranded by them.

Cliffs set up is a Galaxy GT550 with a Collins 753-3 RX and a Drake L-4 Linear. The antenna is a 71 foot crank up tower topped off with a 5 el Wilson 20 meter beam. A Wilson 10-15 Duobander is on the way---watch out world! On 40 and 80, he used dipoles. On the 2 meter regions, he uses a SR-42A and an 8 el Beam.

Cliff likes his Collins RX for CW the bvest of any receiver he's tried, although he feels he gives up something on SSB---but then Cliff is a Charlie Whiskey type. Also, Cliff used to have a 2 el quad, but with only 2 elements he regan to feel the competitive pinch---which won't go for Cliff! A 5 element quad seemed somewhat domineering--and maybe mechanically frightening too--so he went the Yagi route...and likes every minute of it.

One thin Cliff is very strong for is two receivers...the only way for a DXer to operate. That plus lot and whole lots of listening FIRST...before calling. Good advice form a contest winner!

Besides the trophy Cliff picked up at Fresno, he also grabbed off a Richmond Amateur Rakio Club WAS contest--CWonly--trophy when he first got on the air--back in 1956. He did this the hard way--with 100 watts and a BC312 and a dipole. It was getting the cards that took the time--3 months. (How about the 5BWAS; Cliff Bet you could make that in the same time! Nice wall plaque too!

Cliff is primarily a SX Chaser-Contester. Of all the activities available to amateurs, he takes contests first about all. It is the old thrill of the chase-just like the drag racing days, that gets our worthy editor. Now Cliff is first to admit that he will never win the Big Boy trophy which calls for first class location, antennas, etc. That is hard to come by on a town lot inside the city limits. However, Cliff plays the contest game with himself

each year. He tries to beat his last year's record. So far, Cliff has beat himself every year. Cliff makes himself pretty good competition.

Cliff also had a good go at the NCDXC Internal Club Contest. However, he comes up with a good idea to even things out amongest the fellas who can operate all hours and those who are on regular working schedule. Make the contest to cover only so many hours operating time--with you chosing your own times. How about that?

Now if you think Cliff doesn't thrive on competition--let me point out to you that he and K6AUC to ether go through a running battle against all adds every month--to get the DXer out. And they do this without much outside help. Like how many fellas help them out with a paragraph now and then to fill in the viods, or some other thought that might be interesting to the membership? Both our editors are ready and eager to do the job--thankless though it may be. Ask any former editor! One suggestion: would any of you readers be willing to take over the task of editing the DXCC listing on the back page? Just the tallying and record heeping small though it may be, would take a load off the editors.

Cliff says he is not pushing his record on DXCC. After you've got them worked, says Cliff, there's nothing left. And Cliff likes to take it slow and easy and enjoy it all the way. But not so in the contests... He'll fight you all the eay... and love every minute of that too.
