The March meeting was held at Sabellas in Marin County on March 8th. The meeting was called to order at 8:50 P.M. by the president Bob Thompson, K6SSJ.

Don Schliesser, W6MAV, gave a detailed report on the repeater situation. There are several problems. Should we stay on 90 or come through on 30. The second thing we can do is get 30 crystals and operate through their repeater. Third choice is to move to another frequency -- 147.54 is available. Buy crystals and operate simplex. Bill Hansen, W6PTS, suggested a revision, for it is ridiculous to space repeaters only 30 Kcs. away. He said there was no selectivity, and we should get some representation. Bill Vette, K6TXR, said he had made the council aware of the fact we were using 90. Don thought it would be wise to cooperate. The Council issued them 90-30. No pairs available in the Bay Area. The Council advised the repeater would not be in the Bay Area. Don will discuss with the Board of Directors and make a response. Vince Chinn, K6KQN, is the formal representative on this Council.

Bob Thompson discussed the QSL bureau. Possibility of drafting a letter to send in to the ARRL and suggest that they establish an incoming and outgoing bureau. Everybody using the contemplated ARRL bureau would pay a subscription for the service.

Rubin Hughes, WA6AHF, called for a Board of Directors' meeting, because he would like to participate.

Pete Grabosky, WB600L, circulated to make a collection for the bus trip to Fresno. Charge is \$15.00. Dates are April 27-28. Interested members make reservations through Pete.

Bob Thompson announced the request from Chas. Weber, Greater B. A. H. F. for a presentation by the NCDXC during the Ham Fest and the Pacific Division Convention.

There was a second reading for Jeff Sadler, W6DAA. Members voted him in, and he is now a member.

Guests were introduced as follows: Hart, DK2SC; Aoki, JA1WSA; Seppo, OH1VR; Walt., W7FE.

Rubin, WA6AHF, suggested Joe Horvath, W6GPB, stand up because he is a rare visitor, also Bud Baines.

Bob announced the QSL printer is giving up printing of cards. Merle Parten, K6DC, has offered to take cards and handle in the future. VE3DXV/6, Adam, ordered DX cards from Mt. View. Bob doesn't think he is entitled to QSL cards. Doesn't believe in issuing cards to a non-member. The effort should be made to get the master plates. Send them to Rubin.

A motion was carried to send the DX'er to George Drake, K6MHD, in Bettendorf, IA., and make him an honorary member.

Bob read the scores for the ARRL Phone test.

Bob asked for nominations for the DX'er of the Year to be submitted in writing. The award will be presented in Fresno. Lloyd Colvin, W6KG, mentioned qualifications, i.e. QSL manager, participant in DXpedition, 2 meter operations, leader in DX, etc.

Bob announced that one of his aims is to reduce the dues of the club.

New badges were distributed.

Bill Vette, K6TXR, announced that Ray Thomas, W7III, had passed away. Funeral to be in Reno.

Bob introduced the guest speaker, Chuck Townes, K6LFH, President of Oscar Foundation. He gave a very stimulating, detailed summarization of the goals of "Amateur Radio/Sister City Communications Program". He urged the NCDXC to spearhead the project and support it. The aim is for goodwill between U. S. amateurs and foreign countries. He stressed the importance of winning votes at the Geneva ITU Conference in 1978 for amateur radio in order to get frequencies. Each country, regardless of size, has one vote. Ultimate goal is to get every country oriented to amateur radio. The Sister City project will enable hams to foster goodwill. Chuck assured the NCDXC that the ARRL is interested. Doc Gmelin verified this. He encouraged the club to become involved. Don Schliesser, W6MAV, made a motion to appoint a committee to study the program. The mot-

ion was seconded. Bob appointed the following committee: Rubin Hughes, WA6AHF, John Troster, W6ISQ, Jim Maxwell, and Ray Balch, K6VX.

The Round Table was dispensed with, and the meeting was adjourned at 11:00 P.M.

MINUTES OF MARCH BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

The board met 27 March 74 at the Refectory in Oakland. Present were K6SSJ, Bob Thompson; K6DC Merle Parten; W6DOD, Iris Colvin; W6RGG, Bob Vallio; WB6ZUC, Josephine Clarke.

The chief discussion was about the possibility of reducing the club dues. About \$1100 is in the treasury of this non-profit organization and the DXer costs about \$600 a year to produce and distribute. New dues payments will be due in July. Bob, W6RGG, moved that the dues next year shall be the amount stated in the current by-laws plus an assessment to pay for the production and distribution of the DXer; the total of which shall be \$7.50. It was seconded and passed.

The club QSL stock cards are on their way from Oregon and we are looking for a local printer. There are about 35,000 cards left. Bob, K6SSJ, suggested to Pete Hoover a meeting of the two boards of directors in Fresno to confer on a resolution to the ARRL re mutual DX interests. It was found the best time for such a meeting would be between 2-3 Saturday or after the banquet with the joint effort to be presented to the combined membership for approval. Bob will contact Pete on this.

It looks as if the QSL bureau will be taken by the Southern California group and hopefully the transfer can be made at the Fresno meeting. (If this can be agreed upon.)

It was moved, seconded and passed that a perpetual cup for the CQ World Wide DX contest be purchased, subject to mutual agreement & cooperative sharing of costs with the SCDXC.

Minutes March Board Meet (cont.)

This idea will be conveyed to the Southern California DX Club for approval.

Field Day this year was discussed and the consensus was that it should be for fun.

It was suggested the board present a slate of officers to be augmented by nominations from the floor if desired: this to avoid "shotgun" nominations.

It was decided to initiate the Marathon Contest during the summer again to stimulate club activity.

We need more young people in the club to keep it viable and it was agreed that the by-laws would need to be changed to accomplish this.

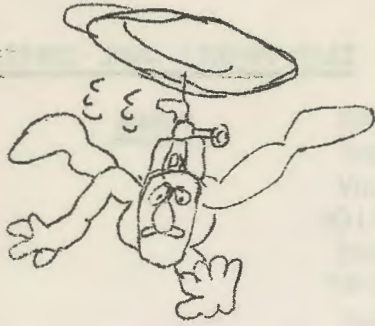

10. Plus all kinds of other goodies, too detailed and numerous to mention.

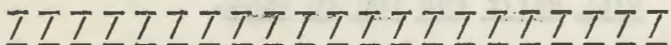

1974 NCDXC INTRA-CLUB DX CONTEST

By popular demand a 1974 intra-club DX Contest will be held from 0001 GMT 1 June 1974 through 2359 GMT, 30 September 1974.

Rules are the same for the contest as the one held two years ago. They are:

1. One point for every new country (ARRL List) worked regardless of band. (No extra points for working a country on additional bands)
2. You must submit results marked for only one category: Phone, CW or mixed (phone and CW). You do not have to choose which category you want to be considered under until the date you submit your results.
3. AWARDS. The top winner in each of the three categories will be awarded an engraved cup at Fresno. The second place winners in each category will be awarded suitable prizes at a NCDXC meet.
4. REPORTING. All logs must be submitted to the club secretary no later than 15 October 1974.

This is a fun contest to stimulate working DX during the summer months. During the contest period everyone is urged to use two meter repeater net to report all DX heard. Someone may need even a DL, G, or F. Call them all out over two meters.

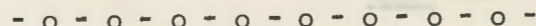

REPEATER NEWS by W6MAV

The California Amateur Relay Council has done it again! This group coordinates frequencies in the Northern California area and has assigned 147.30 - 147.90 as a repeater in the Bay Area. When we got 147.90 as a simplex frequency from the CARC 3 years ago they assured me it would not be assigned to a repeater in the Bay Area.

147.90 is the input of the new repeater so if we use it as a simplex frequency, we, of course, cause the repeater problems. It isn't the fault of the group that has the repeater, they are using their assigned frequency.

The group has offered to buy any crystals that our people want to get rid of. Contact Paul, WA6EUZ at 529-0658.

The new simplex frequency I recommend is 147.54. This has been set as a simplex frequency under the ARRL national frequency plan and the CARC has adopted that plan. This frequency will be good all over the U.S. I have spent a number of evenings, monitoring 147.54 and haven't heard anyone.

Please get a set of crystals on 147.54 so that we don't tie up the repeater with traffic that can better be handled direct.

I have 5 radios to get crystals for so I'm not happy about it either.

FOR THOSE INTERESTED, RTTY JOURNAL, OFFERS A 100 DXCC RTTY CLUB. IN TERMS OF GENERAL INTEREST, ON4BX, IS THE LEADER WITH 128 CONFIRMED, FOLLOWED BY W3KV WITH 127. THAT IF YOU ARE A CERTIFICATE HUNTER, THIS ONE IS A RATHER NICELY DONE CERTIFICATE WITH STICKERS FOR EVERY ADDITIONAL TEN COUNTRIES.

FOR THOSE NOT YET INITIATED TO THIS PHASE OF DXING, MOST OF THE ACTIVITY IS ON 20 METERS BETWEEN 14.075 AND 14.1 MHZ. 80 METERS IS GAINING RAPIDLY IN POPULARITY AND QUITE A BIT OF DX CAN BE FOUND NEAR 3.6 MHZ. FOR THOSE WHO CAN RECEIVE BUT NOT TRANSMIT, CURRENT OPERATION IS ALMOST EXCLUSIVELY 170 ON LOWER SIDEBAND.

TO THE BEST OF MY KNOWLEDGE THE CURRENT COUNT OF NCDXC MEMBERS WITH FULL RTTY CAPABILITY IS 21.
