DEADLINE FOR JULY DXer - JUNE 26TH

Running the DXer by copier requires a little more lead time, so try to have the inputs to the editor by the 26th of June. Also, don't despair if your article isn't published immediately; we are trying to build up a backlog of articles to select from.

DX PERSONALITIES

A currently popular inter-personal relations management course teaches that personalities may be categorized into four major divisions: Drivers, Expressives, Amiables, and Analytcs. Here is how DX'ers fit into all this:

- DRIVER: Uses stacked linears, stacked microphones, and stacked beams as necessary to break the pileup. After breaking the pileup, he takes charge and becomes a list master.
- AMIABLE: Joins the pileup merely to keep from being lonely. When his turn comes up in a list operation, gives it to his buddy.
- EXPRESSIVE: Calls CQ for the "strongest BY station only" using stereo mikes and an echo-verb. When he breaks a pileup, sells his 25 year old gear to the DX station.
- ANALYTIC: Works DX only after calling Don Search to be sure the papers are in. Also runs reams of data through his computer in an effort to determine when the optimum time is to call. Typically misses out and makes his call after the DX station goes QRT or leaves the island.

MARATHON TIME AGAIN

Beginning June 1 at 0000 UTC and ending August 31 at 2359 UTC, is the annual Northern California DX Club Marathon DX Contest. My apologies for not having this in the May issue, but you have plenty of time to catch up, if this is the first notice you have.

The contest categories are PHONE, CW and MIXED mode. Members may submit for one category only. To qualify for MIXED mode, the entrant must work at least 25% of the countries on either phone or cw. A country may only be counted once, regardless of the band.

Contest logs will be submitted to the contest chairman before October 1st.

Contest logs shall include the following information:

1. Consecutive numbering of countries worked.
2. Call sign of station worked.
3. Date and time (UTC).
4. Band and mode.
5. Name of country.

A duplicate sheet must accompany the entry. The ARRL Countries List is recommended for this purpose.

Complete details will be found in the NCDXC Procedures Manual, Section 7-101 on page 36.

Contest period--Phone: 0000 UTC June 20, 1981 to 2400 UTC June 21, 1981. CW: 0000 UTC August 22, 1981 to 2400 UTC August 23, 1981. There are eight entry classifications: single operator, single band--160 thru 10 (exception, CW only on 160); single operator, multi-band; and multi operator, multi band. Exchange: RS(T) report plus two figures denoting the operators age--YL stations: RS(T) report plus "00".

Club member N6RO was top scorer for North America in 1979 and 1980 in the single operator, multi band classification, congratulations Ken. Scotty, AE6U was top scorer for North America for 160 meters in 1980; club members N6AN, K6RU, W6SZN and K6XT also participated in the 1980 test.

NCDXC BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

May 18, 1981

Meeting was held at the home of W6VG and present were AA6AD president Bruno Bienenfeld, WD6DLK treasurer Gene Spinelli, Ted Davis W6BJH, Hal Godfrey N6AN, and W6VG Ron Panton secretary. Meeting got under way at 742 PM local Menlo Park time.

Our guest was Ken Ruddick of the NCCC who asked for the support of the NCDXC in the all-out effort the NCCC is making this year (1981) in the CQ WW contest. In exchange, the NCCC will throw their efforts towards our total score in the 1982 in the ARRL CW and Fone DX contest. The NCDXC board urges all NCDXC members who hold dual membership to help to the best of their capabilities. Any contest oriented NCDXC members are also urged to join the NCCC.

Rod Dinkins AC6V, our esteemed DXer editor, would like to promote more advertising for the DXer. This would make the DXer almost cost free to the NCDXC. The board agrees with Rod's ideas. Our picnic this year will be held sometime during the period 15 - 30 September.

Visalia 1981 discussed, with both problem areas and successful areas looked at. We would like to start early on the promotion of the 1983 convention so - plans are under way.

A motion by WD6DLK was made that the NCDXC offer to donate QSL cards to N6ST and N7KA for their West Indies DXpedition, if the NCDXC gets mentioned on the cards. We hope we will have a club logo for this purpose very soon. The board approved a motion that the NCDXC will donate up to \$200 towards cost of printing DXpedition QSL cards for NCDXC members in good standing who go on DXpeditions. NCDXC must have full discretion on the type, design and quality of cards. There must be credit to NCDXC printed on cards, with logo. Prior approval from the board of directors must be obtained before the commencement of the DXpedition. No postage or envelope costs will be defrayed by the NCDXC.

A motion by W6VG to print an interim roster was not approved. The next roster will be printed later in the year per the Procedures Manual. Up-dates will be published in the DXer. N6AN proposed we make up a list of club members and their names similar to the list made up by SCDXC for their members. It was pointed out that W6NLG and W6VG are in the process now of preparing such a list. One side will have the SCDXC and the other side the NCDXC.

The NCDXC club marathon DX contest will start June 1, 1981. All members are urged to participate and please help push the California Award. Phil Frazier K6ZM has too much spare time and is looking forward to receiving more applications for the award.

Good luck with this DX quiz! This quiz will test your knowledge of current DX operations. The quiz is based upon information printed in the DX bulletins, information printed on the QSL cards from the DX operations mentioned, and from other sources. If you have really been active the last two plus years, you will be prepared to win this quiz!

A list of DXers and a list of DX operations are on the other side of this paper. Each DXer is assigned a number. All you have to do is associate the DXer's number with the appropriate DX operation and write the DXer's number in the answer block for the DX operation. For instance, the SM0CCM/NS6 operation reported in the DX bulletins was from the QTH of KB6YU. Therefore, KB6YU, who is DX'er number 35, is associated with SM0CCM/NS6. This "free" answer is written in for you.

A correct answer may be a blank, just as some DX'ers may be associated with more than one operation. There may also be some DX'ers just thrown in for good measure who aren't associated with any of the operations in this quiz. 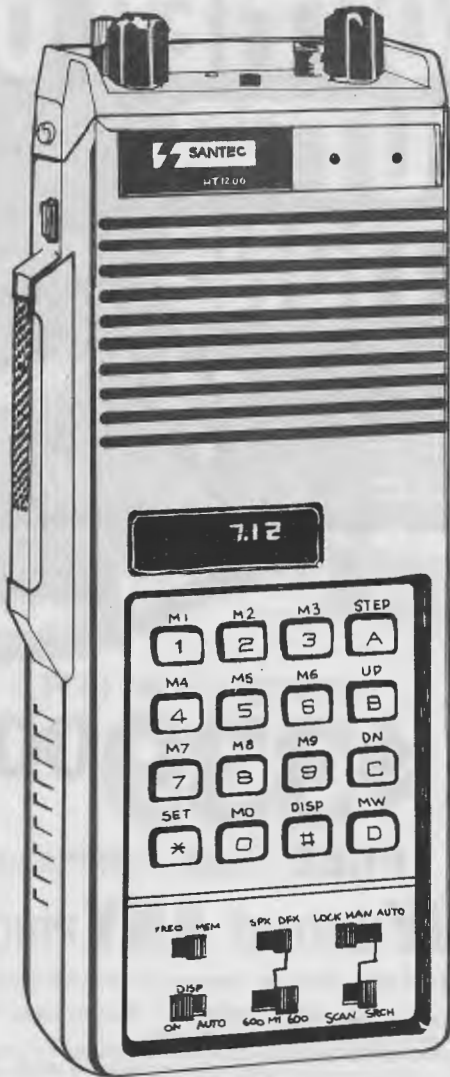
