Valid QSO By N7NG

Here is another item of interest to DXers. This piece will straighten out a lot of things folks have been wondering about.

I asked Wayne for permission for the DXer to reprint it. He sez OK. And note that he is member of NCDXC. He is a native of Redwood City and graduated from Sequoia HS there—hi. As you know, he is now head of Membership Services at ARRL.

The following from Wayne Mills, N7NG, (long-time NCDXC member). Wayne is Head of Membership Services at ARRL Headquarters.

To the best of my knowledge, there is no specific definition of a contact. The DXCC rules do, however, state that contacts must be "two-way." This implies at least some exchange of information. Perhaps the most basic information in communicating with someone else is the fact that you are communicating with someone at all. The next order of business would be to determine with whom each of the parties is communicating. In my view, since there is nothing actually specified in DXCC rules, this is the minimum information exchange implied by those rules:

Each part must actually HEAR FOR HIMSELF, enough information to determine the identity of other party. Communicating through a third part or "relay" doesn't qualify.

While the exchange and accurate copying of a signal report is not specifically required, there seems to be some sense that it is a good third level of communication. Why else would be do it so often? Why don't we just exchange callsigns? Good questions. The more you can communicate, the better the quality of your contact, I suppose. Still, DXCC does not require a signal report. It's up to you to define your own DXCC in this (and some other) sense.

Al Lotze, W6RQ, Silent Key

It is with great sorrow and a sense of personal loss that we report the passing of Al Lotze, W6RQ whose key became silent on October 29, 2000. He was 85 years of age.

Al was a longtime NCDXC member and a student of atmospheric and solar phenomena. His study of sunspot activity was legendary and for many years he was the voice of radio propagation on the Thursday Night Net. His most recent contribution to the Club was a series of three articles, which were published in the September, October and November 1999 issues of the *DXer*.

Al and I shared a personal kinship, having both been born and raised in Terre Haute, Indiana. We both attended Rose Polytechnic Institute, but Al graduated in 1937 - when I was only one year old. We loved to reminisce about "Dear Old Rose" whenever we had the chance.

It is my personal belief that the passing of Al Lotze means our Club and Ham Radio, in general, have lost a great treasure.

Decades ago, there was an awards tracking book published, which stated that a minimum signal report (33 or 339) was required for DXCC contacts. I have researched this, but I have never been able to find such a reference in the DXCC rules. I have asked Bob White, W1CW about this, and he doesn't recall any such requirement.

I would like to mention at this point that it is quite easy to avoid both of these fundamental requirements. It happens all the time. If you are attempting to establish contact with a weak station, and a "helper" on the frequency must say "over" at the end of one transmission so that the other party knows when to start his transmission, what is being conceded is that one party simply can-

Online *DXer* By Dick Letrich, W6KM

This article is addressed to those of you who both have computers and would like to help the club keep the cost of membership dues from going up. You can contribute to this cause in a very easy and special way. Because we are in the digital age, it is (and for quite some time has been) possible to view the *DXer* on the Club's web site. It is also possible to print a copy of it. Therefore, you have the option of foregoing a printed and mailed hard copy of the *DXer* and, instead, viewing it on the web.

Now it is a fact that some members don't have a computer. Others who do, may not wish to print down the *DXer* or look at it in this manner. That's OK. But, let me point out some reasons why, by not requiring a mailed hard copy of the *DXer*, you can benefit in several ways.

First, many members just look at the *DXer* and then either discard it or lose it around the shack and never look at it again. If you have a computer and want to look at the current issue or for that matter a past issue again, all you have to do is go to the web site and bring it up on the computer screen. Yes, I know it takes a few minutes for the Adobe reader to load it. But when it does, you can look at all of the pictures in full color! It has been pointed out to me that if your eyesight is not what it used to be, you can also enlarge the print to a size that makes for easy reading. You also, get it several days earlier than those who get it via the US SNAIL MAIL. Yes, you can print it out if you want to take advantage of keeping a copy around or for instance if it has a form or sked that you want to keep handy you don't have to cut up a real copy. These are some of the advantages to you, the member. Now what would this mean for the club?

For openers, it will help to reduce the operating costs in several ways. Number one, it will save the cost of postage, not just for one month or year, but for as many years as you are a member. Secondly, it would mean that fewer copies of the paper have to be printed, thus reducing printing costs. It would reduce the number of labels that have to be printed and affixed to the *DXer*. None of this may have a direct impact on you, but it would have a huge impact on the cost of the club doing business. If enough members were to take advantage of this method of getting the *DXer*, it could add up to a sizeable saving to the cost of operating the club.

Would this, by itself, keep the Annual Club Dues from going up? Maybe. Maybe not. But, if the Dues have to increase (and we are not at this point, with dues of \$24 a year, breaking even) it may help keep the costs from sky rocketing in the future.

Remember, you do not have to volunteer to get the *DXer* via the Club Web Site. But, if you do, you will join the following members who care enough to stand up and be counted.



Bad News from FCC an Excerpt from the Pacific Division Update

The FCC has denied an ARRL Petition for Reconsideration calling on the Commission to declare that PRB-1 applies to amateurs living in areas governed by CC&Rs or condominium regulations just as it does to hams regulated solely by local zoning laws. The FCC Order also seeks to “amplify” the definition of the oft-cited “reasonable accommodation” phrase in PRB-1 with respect to local land use and zoning.

The FCC Order said the League failed to demonstrate any “significant change in the underlying rationale of the PRB-1 decision” that would necessitate revisiting the issue.

“The Order provides some additional clarification on the extent of PRB-1 preemption, but it falls short of providing the relief that ARRL was seeking,” said ARRL Executive Vice President David Sumner, K1ZZ. Because Deputy Wireless Telecommunications Bureau Chief Kathleen O’Brien Ham issued the November 13 Order under what’s known as “delegated authority,” the ARRL was mulling whether to submit an application for review by the full Commission.

Sumner said the ARRL believes the issue is “critically important.” He said the League continues to gather additional information and to plan on how to present its arguments more persuasively before the FCC. The FCC Order said that even if the Commission does have authority to address CC&Rs within the context of Amateur Radio facilities, “this alone does not necessarily warrant revisiting the exclusion of CC&Rs” from PRB-1. The ARRL has argued that the FCC has Congressional author-

ity to prohibit restrictive covenants that could keep property owners and even renters from installing antennas to receive TV, satellite and similar signals. The same principle, the ARRL asserts, applies to Amateur Radio. The FCC Order says, however, that ham antennas are not like over-the-air reception device antennas, “which are very limited in size in residential areas.” Regardless of the extent of the FCC’s discretion with respect to CC&Rs generally, “we are not persuaded by ARRL’s arguments that it is appropriate at this time to consider exercising such discretion with respect to amateur station antenna preemption,” the Order said.

In its initial denial a year ago, the FCC strongly encouraged associations of homeowners and private contracting parties to “follow the principle of reasonable accommodation” with respect to Amateur Radio.

The FCC Order also took the opportunity to clarify by example what PRB-1 means by “reasonable accommodation” in terms of amateur antennas. The Order says the FCC does not believe that zoning that provides for extreme or excessive prohibition of amateur communications “could be deemed to be a reasonable accommodation.” As an example, the Order said, “we believe that a regulation that would restrict amateur communications using small dish antennas, antennas that do not present any safety or health hazard, or antennas that are similar to those normally permitted for viewing television” is not reasonable accommodation or minimum practicable regulation.

On the other hand, the Order said, communities wanting to “preserve

residential areas as livable neighborhoods” would be free to adopt zoning that forbids antennas “commonly and universally associated with those that one finds in a factory area or an industrialized complex.” The FCC conceded that while such rules could constrain amateur communications, “we do not view it as failing to provide reasonable accommodation to amateur communications.”

The FCC Order also stuck to the earlier conclusion that the current standards for “reasonable accommodation and minimum practicable regulation” spelled out in PRB-1 “are sufficiently specific to cover any concerns related to unreasonable fees or onerous conditions.”

The Order said the FCC continues to believe that it should “not specify precise height limitations below which a community may not regulate, given the varying circumstances that may occur.”

The Order combined the FCC’s response to the ARRL petition with its response to a similar filing from Barry N. Gorodetzer, N4IFE and Kathy Conrad-Gorodetzer, KF4IDH, of Ft. Lauderdale, Florida. The FCC Order is at
