

QST de W1AW/6

For 24 hours, from 1200Z on July 14, to 1200Z (that's 8 AM Eastern Daylight time, 5 AM Pacific Daylight, etc.), July 15, 2001, the ARRL Headquarters station call sign will be activated from CALIFOR-NIA as W1AW/6 for the duration of the IARU HF World Championship Contest. Prominent contest operator teams in Northern California Contest Club territory will make this unique station call-sign available to the world, and attempt to top the IARU Headquarters competition category in this event. The current champion and record holder in this class is the German team, DA0HQ, who made nearly 20,000 QSO's in last year's running. We hope that active USA amateurs will contribute to the 2001 USA HQ team score by contacting W1AW/6 on all band modes, 160 through 10m, SSB and CW.

To make your experience of working W1AW/6 even more special, a certificate will be issued for North American stations that work W1AW/6 on 8 or band/modes, and 6 band/modes for stations outside North America. A special endorsement will be made for those stations that work W1AW/6 on all 12 band/modes. More details on the awards and the operation can be found at www.nccc.cc/. Included there will be lots of hints on "how to work W1AW/6", including propagation information, best times on the low bands, etc.

Look for W1AW/6 near the following frequencies for USA/DX:

CW: 1818/1833; 3538/3508; 7038/7008; 14038; 21038; 28038

SSB: 1848; 3838/3798; 7238/7158; 14238/14158; 21338; 28338

The IARU contest will be a fun event for all amateurs, whether you are a contester, DXer, award hunter or casual operator who might want to contact this one-of-a-kind W1AW/6 operation. Contest rules are at http://www.arrl.org/contests/announcements/rules-iaru.html or on page 111, April 2001 QST.

Is Anyone Out There? By George Allan, W6YD

I recently read a story by Mark Hansen in the book, "Chicken Soup for the Soul" which he co-authored. The title of the story is: "Are You Going To Help Me?" It takes place in Armenia in 1989 after an 8.2 earthquake nearly flattened the country and killed 30,000 people in less than four minutes. Rather than lose impact by attempting to paraphrase the story, the following is quoted directly from the book.

In the midst of the utter devastation and chaos, a father left his wife securely at home and rushed to the school where his son was supposed to be, only to discover that the building was flat as a pancake.

After the traumatic initial shock, he remembered the promise he had made to his son: "No matter what, I'll always be there for you!" And tears began to fill his eyes. As he looked at the pile of debris that once was the school, it looked hopeless, but he kept remembering his commitment to his son.

He began to concentrate on where he walked his son to class at school each morning. Remembering his son's classroom would be in the back right corner of the building, he rushed there and started digging through the rubble.

As he was digging, other forlorn parents arrived clutching their hearts, saying: "My son!" "My daughter!" Other well meaning parents tried to pull him off of what was left of the school saying:

"It's too late!"

"They're dead!"

"You can't help!"

"Go home!"

"Come on, face reality, there's nothing you can do!"

"You're just going to make things worse!"

To each parent he responded with one line: "Are you going to help me now?" And then he proceeded to dig for his son, stone by stone.

The fire chief showed up and tried to pull him off of the school's debris saying "Fires are breaking out, explosions are happening everywhere. You're in danger. We'll take care of it. Go home." To which this loving, caring Armenian father asked, "Are you going to help me now?"

The police came and said, "You're angry, distraught and it's over. You're endangering others. Go home. We'll handle it!" To which he replied, "Are you going to help me now?" No one helped.

Courageously he proceeded alone because he needed to know for himself: "Is my boy alive or is he dead?"

He dug for eight hours ... 12 hours ... 24 hours ... 36 hours ... then, in the 38th hour, he pulled back a boulder and heard his son's voice. He screamed his son's name, "ARMAND!" He heard back, "Dad!?! It's me, Dad I told the other kids not to worry. I told 'em that if you were alive, you'd save me and when you saved me, they'd be saved. You promised, 'No matter what, I'll always be there for you!' You did it, Dad!"

"What's going on in there? How is it?" the father asked.

"There are 14 of us left out of 33, Dad. We're scared, hungry, thirsty and thankful you're here. When the building collapsed, it made a wedge, like a triangle, and it saved us."

"Come on out, boy!"

"No, Dad! Let the other kids come out first, 'cause I know you'll get me! No matter what, I know you'll be there for me!"

So, are you gonna be there for your club, no matter what? Or will you be content to walk away and let it die for lack of interest?

It seems apparent that it will take much more than a pep talk from me to stir you out of your complacency. But, let me just say this: this club cannot continue to exist for long as it is right now. There are far too few people doing far too many things. Sooner or later, either you will have step up or the club WILL go down the tubes! It's that simple!

Look at the current leadership: W6VG has been secretary and has done more jobs for more years than I care to count and all the while, calling for someone to step in and replace him, "before it's too late". W6KM served as president for two years - not because he wanted to be president for another year, but because nobody else had the guts to step up to the task. In addition. Dick has been the force behind the DXer Profiles, he mails out the DXer every month and takes most of the pictures at club meetings. You'll also see him organizing the club picnic and serving as one of the two cooks. Who will do these things when Dick burns out? K6RK is beginning his second successive year as president (his third year in total) again, not because he wanted to serve another year, but because not one of you had the guts to step up to the task!

Personally, I'm into my third year as your DXer editor and I just finished chairing my third International DX Convention. And, while I'm very grateful for the help we did get, we found it necessary this year both to recruit help from outside our club and to pay other clubs to get all of the help we needed for the Convention. I find this to be a bitter pill to swallow - especially when the talent is available right here in our own club!

Who will step up to the task of organizing and running IDXC 2003, which I refuse to chair? Will you just sit by and let another club run it? I certainly hope not! Or maybe you just don't care!

Is anyone out there? Does anyone care? Are you going to help me now? When will YOU GET INVOLVED?



DXer Profile: W6YHM, Don Eberlein


If you are like me, you often wonder what the person whose voice is on the other end looks like. Most of the time we hear members, but never seem to have the opportunity to actually meet them in person. Our profile for this month is a case in point. For years I have had the pleasure of listening to Don Eberlein, W6YHM on the air - mostly as net control for our Thursday night 2 meter net. Well, I recently had the pleasure of meeting Don and his wife in person.

As you can tell from the pictures, Don has a great location as well as some very super antennas. He was first licensed in 1936 on the East Coast as W2JKG. He has operated as ZL0AAF and as a portable KL7 in his work on a research vessel. His main rig is a Ten-Tec Omni 6, which he has had the factory update. His back up rig is a KENWOOD TS-940 and the tuner is a Murch UT-2000B (it will load a hairpin) and his current Amp is a Heathkit SB220. He estimates his Hy-Gain DX 14 sits 750 feet above sea level.

Don's main mode of operation is CW, but he uses SSB when the spirit moves him. As a "60 year, plus" member of the ARRL, he has almost every award available, including Honor Roll. Don needs only a few more (so do many of us) to have 'em all. His country count is 334 mixed with 301 on phone and 327 on CW! Don has been a member of NCDXC since 1987 and, while he is unable to attend meetings, he keeps active in the club as Net Control on the Thursday night 2 meter net.


