Long Gone Golden Days by Hugh Cassidy, WA6AUD

Jack Troster called this morning to discuss the Don Miller item in the January DXer. As usual, we old timers like to talk about the long gone golden days of other eras.

The article on Don Miller was first printed in the West Coast DX Bulletin in June 1977, the 10th anniversary month of Miller's visit to the NCDXC at the Fork and Cork in San Bruno. This did not jibe with the opening date on the article you copied off the Internet. It does seem that VE1DX made the date change to make the item more relevant to the present.

The WCDXB ceased publication in July 1979. Frankly it had grown to be too big.

It was trimmed down a bit for inclusion in "DX IS" compiled by the Allen brothers, this a small soft cover book which consisted of quotes from the WCDXB that they put together a good many years ago. What you printed was the original copy as shown in the WCDXB, complete all the way.

Even then it was realized that telling of those days and a recounting of things that happened was a bit complex and still is at times a bit hard to follow. Some have indicated that they did not want to even hear, or read, about it or what the message might be.

Sometimes, for articles in the WCDXB, we were taken to task and castigated for kicking a sleeping dog. I will tell at length one instance that is well remembered.

The CW operators in the Seventies pressed the ARRL for a CW DXCC award. The award was authorized and a good many CW operators set out to be the holder of the #1 CW DXCC Award.

There was soon heard muttering that things were not straight arrow or even flying correctly at the crossroads. Some CW DXers complained to their local ARRL Director about the practices of some CW DXers seeking the CW DXCC award. Eventually, it was brought up at an ARRL Board meeting in downtown Newington. Frankly, the ARRL Directors sitting in a closed session could not get a good understanding of what the complaints were all about. Essentially the basis for the complaint was that some of the CW QSLs accepted for the award were not quite what they seemed or should be.

The problem? One distinguished CW DXer was working stations and getting

credit in situations where the DX station did not even have a key in his shack nor could copy code.

The distinguished one would call on phone an operator in a country he needed for a CW QSL. After the initially contacting the station by phone and after phone report exchanges, he would ask the DX station to stand by for a contact in pure Morse, this for a CW QSL. It mattered not if the DX station said he could not read code, just listen for the signal and then when the dots and dashes stopped, just acknowledge hearing it. As for all of this, just send a QSL and preferably send a QSL showing it was made in a CW mode contact. The latter was often emphasized, the DX station would be instructed: "Show the mode in code, please!".

The question on this matter was raised in a session of the ARRL Board of Directors. Frankly, they were soon going nowhere being a bit stuck in trying to understand what the problem was and why.

Then one director suggested that a CW DXer was right then present in the outer room, he was a CW DXer of some note and perhaps he could be asked to help clarify things. So they called this expert in, put the question to him and they got an answer. "Just jealousy and incompetent operating technique" was the explanation given in pure expertise. That would sound logical, wouldn't it?

The ARRL Board, relieved of a problem that they had bothered them but now was easily and clearly understood, went on to other business on the agenda.

The WCDXB had a different idea. The vice-director called in for his expertise was the most notorious one of the "listen for my signal" activists and "be sure to show the contact was made in CW code". This one was probably the main reason for the increasing vocal complaints being heard out in the wilderness and far from downtown Newington.

So we went and printed what we thought was the whole story as it was seen from the DX bulletin perspective. It got action. Soon the rules were changed so that a two-way CW QSL was necessary, not just a one-sided one with a code illiterate in a needed country..

We later got a terse note from the "DX Expert" on this one. "Why don't you keep

your nose out of where it does not belong" we were told and a fresh and frosty relationship rose with his son-in-law, also a DXer.

I tell this story to show how often little was known, understood or practiced about DX-ing in those medieval times. In the Don Miller case, there was similar puzzlement and the local ARRL Director would often in the evenings phone me (I was an SCM at that time) to ask for an explanation of some developments in the Don Miller/ARRL dispute.

All of the above is well into the past. I cleaned out the shack some years back and sent all the WCDXB file to VE1DX up in Nova Scotia. I also sent some fifty years of my QST files. I thought that it was a good place to deposit all those years of gathered history and information. Paul up there had written asking if it was okay to simulate the way anecdotes and other grave matters had been hauled in the years of the WCDXB.

We had no objections and also managed to pass on to him all the files that I could not touch without having to sit down and read them again.

Though I have never seen Don Miller save for that June night in 1967, I have had the feeling that he has read what we wrote of him. We did try to write on a level field and, while we did, work Don Miller on Heard Island and a good number of places.

We also did sometimes think that it was then a different world and many of the concepts believed in back then often were different than current viewpoints changing with the passage of the years.

Enough—

I still think that the Don Miller caper was a watershed in DX history. Things never were the same again but at the same time one must consider that Don Miller was not a lone instance nor a one time happening. There were others.

Don Miller was a good operator and he did raise the curtains on a lot of new DX countries. Some were good. Some were not. He was intelligent. He also was possibly a bit arrogant. But he was a DXer long remembered. And still is. In spite of everything that happened, I still think that he was a tip top operator.

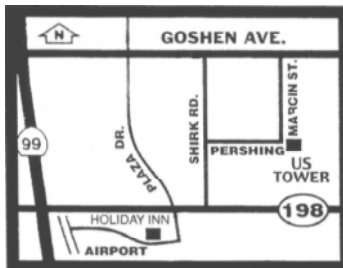
