ONE-SIXTY Yugoslavia appears to have moved to give the YU-amateucs privileges on the onemsixty band, YU1PCF being worked there last week.
Tine Brajnik, YU3EY, reports that he will be active on one-sixty and that it may only be ten kc wide.....the band, that is. Initially it was indicated that the segment might be down around 1775 kc bui the activity last week around 1830ke might indicate that the efforts to move the segment were successful.
YU3EY says he will be active in the ARRI CW Test next month and he will concentrate on the lower bands.
There was a meeting in Scandinavia this week to plan for presentations to several of the Scandiravian countries on one-sixty privileges. Those represented included amateurs from $\mathrm{OZ} / \mathrm{OY} / \mathrm{LA} / \mathrm{SM}$ and OH ...where the amateurs already have the one-bixty band: In the North Sea and Baltic areas there has Been increasing use of the one-sixty band by fishermen as an auxiliary ship-to-shore band. The amateurs feel that they have a good chance here.
Also good possibilities in the near future are CT and I-Italy. In Portugal any 160 permission is expected to include CT2 and CT3. There are already reports that some Italian stations have been hesrd.

This was an active area, on 14 th it was showing 25 spots and covering 210/millionths of the sun's surfacee The upper srea is No. 770, it showing five spots covering $30 / \mathrm{millionth}$ area on the dor of this chart. This area showed on Jamusy it was at $22^{\circ} \mathrm{N}$ and $07^{\circ} \mathrm{W}$ when charted.
Just in case you are curious, No. 769-1asted $14^{\circ} \mathrm{N}$ on the 17 th and was gone the next day. millionths of the surface.

Looking back, there were four regions between Dccember 25 th ard Juatmary 8 th which showed spots. Sometimes there are regions...' 1 \& 4 get'。.. whidh do not show spots and No 765 and 767 turned into plages after shdwing just a spot or two. Anyhow, of the four active regions, only one was associated with the old Cycle 20, the other three belonging to new Cycle 24.
